

## **PROJECT / INNOVATIONS**

Amobia is one of the villages in my catchment area. Gastrointestinal diseases, helminthiases and skin infection used to be prevalent among the people. This was evidenced by community members regularly reporting during community outreach clinics. Upon assessment I realized the community was lacking portable water. I uploaded a documentary on the situation on FACEBOOK and someone offered a support for construction of a Well. The support was in the form of money. The well was subsequently upgraded to a mechanized borehole by an NGO which is currently serving the people. On evaluation the cases of gastrointestinal diseases, helminthiases and skin infection have reduced in the community. This is evidenced by the records in the outreach consulting register.

Secondly, I belong to an NGO called Joyous Foundation. Our main focus is to offer livelihood support to people living with disability in rural communities. They are reached out to once a year. However, midwives started complaining about postpartum mothers not being able to settle their delivery bills due to spousal neglect. I reached out to the founder of my NGO who ordered for investigations into the situation. After the investigation we found out that poverty and discrimination against the sex of the baby(girl) were the main cause of the spousal neglect. The NGO then diverted its focus to solving the situation through public education and settling of delivery bills of victims. This was started in October 2024 and it is ongoing. So far three settlements have been made. Among them were one caesarian section delivery and two spontaneous vaginal delivery.

Thirdly, I have been assisting parents who wanted to send their wards to health training institution with the required information.

I have been able to lobby for the construction of a urinal for my facility by a fun club called Biakoye club located in Kumawu Bodomasi.

Jesus care voluntary clinic is a private health facility. It has a public health unit which is managed and supervised by Ghana health service where I work as a unit manager. The facility encountered administrative challenges which led to a shut down by HeFRA. I reached out to the CEO to ascertain the actual problem which I helped her solve. I was then appointed as the administrator of the facility while still managing the public health unit.
