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GCNM PARTNERS GHANA MEDICAL TRUST FUND TO ADVANCE SPECIALIST NURSING TRAINING



The Ghana College of Nurses and Midwives (GCNM) has signed a landmark collaboration agreement with the Ghana Medical Trust Fund to support the expansion of specialist nursing and midwifery training across the country.

The agreement, signed on Wednesday, May 6, 2026, at the Ghana Medical Trust Fund Office in Cantonments, Accra, marks a significant step toward strengthening Ghana's healthcare workforce and enhancing specialist nursing education in line with national healthcare priorities.

Representing the College, Mr. Amos Otuah, Vice-Rector of the Mental Health Division, signed the agreement alongside other senior officials of the College, demonstrating a strong commitment to advancing specialist healthcare training in Ghana.

The partnership aims to address critical gaps within the health sector through the training of highly skilled specialist nurses and midwives. Key focus areas include critical care, emergency nursing, oncology, endocrinology, nephrology, and cardiovascular nursing.

Speaking at the signing ceremony, Mr. Otuah noted that the collaboration aligns with the College's mandate to provide advanced specialist education and contribute to strengthening Ghana's health system. He emphasized that investment in specialist nursing education remains essential to improving patient outcomes and ensuring equitable access to quality healthcare nationwide.

The support from the Ghana Medical Trust Fund is expected to enhance residency and fellowship training programmes at the College, equipping nurses and midwives with advanced competencies to meet the growing complexities of healthcare delivery.

The Ghana College of Nurses and Midwives reaffirmed its commitment to building strategic partnerships that promote excellence in education, research, and clinical practice while contributing to national and global health priorities.

INTERNATIONAL NURSES DAY 2026

GRNMA Advocates Empowerment and Stronger Health Systems

The Ghana Registered Nurses and Midwives Association (GRNMA), in collaboration with its specialized societies and affiliate groups, commemorated International Nurses Day 2026 with a national launch and a series of activities aimed at celebrating the nursing profession, promoting workforce

empowerment, and advancing dialogue on strengthening Ghana's healthcare system. Observed globally on 12 May in honour of Florence Nightingale, the celebration aligns with the International Council of Nurses (ICN) theme, "Our Nurses, Our Future: Empowered Nurses Save Lives."

As part of the commemoration, GRNMA organized two major events: the Nurses Café and the official national launch.

The Nurses Café, held on 10 May 2026 at the Dr. Dorcia Kesseih Hall of the GRNMA National Secretariat, celebrated the distinguished career and legacy of Nana Kusi-Yeboah under the theme, “Celebrating Empowerment: The Remarkable Journey of Nana Kusi-Yeboah.” Nana Kusi-Yeboah, a retired Deputy Director of Nursing Services of the Ghana Health Service, was recognized for her exceptional contributions to maternal and newborn health, public health nursing, and professional mentorship. Her four-decade career included service at the Korle Bu Teaching Hospital, international consultancy work with WHO, PATH, and JHPIEGO, and pioneering contributions to the introduction of Vitamin K administration for newborns in Ghana and the development of the WHO Partograph. She also serves as Queen Mother of Apampramu under the stool name Nana Serwaa Akoto.



The event further highlighted her receipt of the inaugural GRNMA President’s Award in December 2025. A panel discussion featuring Mr. Courage A.Y.F. Kwame-Kumah and Assistant Superintendent Theresa Sarfo-Bonsu reflected on Nana’s legacy, emphasizing the importance of mentorship, policy advocacy, and the integration of community leadership with modern healthcare practice.

The official launch of International Nurses Day took place on 12 May 2026 at the Dr. Docia Kisseih Hall, GRNMA National Headquarters, Shiashie, Accra, attracting over 450 participants, including nursing leaders, government representatives, development partners, training institutions, retired members, specialized societies, and affiliate groups.

Distinguished guests included the Minister of Health, Hon. Kwabena Mintah Akandoh, represented by Deputy Minister Hon. Prof. Dr. Grace Ayensu-Danquah and Chief Director Mr. Desmond Boateng; Hon. Dr. Mark Kurt Nawaane,

Chairman of the Parliamentary Select Committee on Health; Dr. Fiona Braka, WHO Country Representative; Prof. Florence Naab, Dean of the School of Nursing and Midwifery, University of Ghana; Dr. Samuel Kaba Akoriyea, Director-General of the Ghana Health Service; Alhaji Dawuda Ibrahim Braimah, Chief Labour Officer; and Rev. Fr. Osmund Kudoloh.

In her address, GRNMA President Mrs. Perpetual Ofori-Ampofo underscored the seven powers of nursing identified in the ICN 2026 report, including trust, professionalism, practice, and peace, and called for increased investment in the profession. Key speakers emphasized collaboration, mentorship, occupational safety, improved welfare systems, and professional development as essential components of workforce empowerment.



Delivering the keynote address, Prof. Florence Naab highlighted the realities confronting nurses in Ghana, including understaffing, burnout, inadequate infrastructure, and limited support systems.

She stressed that collective empowerment, mentorship, and continuous professional development remain critical to strengthening healthcare delivery and improving patient outcomes.

A symbolic Rally Around the Lamp ceremony paid tribute to the enduring legacy of Florence Nightingale and the dedication of nurses and midwives across generations.

The event also featured the official recognition of 14 GRNMA specialized societies, reaffirming the Association's commitment to professional unity and advancement.

The celebration concluded with a renewed call for sustained investment in nursing and midwifery, recognizing empowered nurses and midwives as indispensable to resilient, compassionate, and quality healthcare delivery in Ghana.

MADAM HADIA BABA: CHAMPIONING MATERNAL HEALTH AND MENTAL WELLBEING



Madam Hadia Baba is a distinguished Ghanaian midwife, educator, and public health advocate whose contributions continue to advance maternal healthcare in Ghana. Beginning her career as a Community Health Nurse at Gambaga Health Centre, she developed extensive experience in rural healthcare delivery, maternal and child welfare, and community outreach.

She later joined Tamale Teaching Hospital, where she rose through the ranks to become a Senior Midwifery Officer, serving in the Labour Ward, Antenatal Care Unit, and Pre-natal Ward. Her work has significantly contributed to clinical coordination, maternal health education, mentorship, and quality healthcare delivery.

Beyond clinical practice, Madam Hadia has contributed immensely to nursing and midwifery education as an examiner, tutor, and mentor for several training institutions, including the Nursing and Midwifery Council of Ghana and the University for Development Studies.

A passionate advocate for maternal mental health, she initiated an innovative intervention project at Tamale Teaching Hospital focused on the early detection and management of postpartum depression and psychosis among mothers. The initiative successfully reduced postpartum depression cases from 10 percent in 2022 to 6 percent in 2025, while providing critical support and recovery services for affected mothers.

Through her leadership, innovation, and compassionate service, Madam Hadia Baba continues to demonstrate that safe motherhood extends beyond childbirth to include the emotional wellbeing and dignity of every mother.

MIDWIFE SPOTLIGHT: STELLA BAYOR CHAMPIONS EXCELLENCE IN MATERNAL HEALTHCARE

Stella Bayor, a Senior Midwifery Officer and dedicated peer mentor in Ghana's Upper West Region, continues to make remarkable contributions to maternal and newborn healthcare through leadership, advocacy, and mentorship.

With 18 years of experience in healthcare, Stella began her professional journey in 2008 as a Community Health Nurse before qualifying as a Registered Midwife in 2015. Her academic progression reflects her commitment to professional excellence and lifelong learning. She holds a Certificate in Community Health Nursing, a Diploma in Midwifery, and a Bachelor of Science in Midwifery, and is currently pursuing a Master of Public Health degree.

Since 2019, Stella has actively championed women's health as a cervical and breast cancer advocate. She is also a registered member and Regional Coordinator of the Ghana Chapter of the International Papilloma virus Society (IPVS), where she contributes to awareness creation and preventive health initiatives.

Her passion for maternal and newborn health has led to collaborations with international organizations, including UNICEF, IPAS, USAID, and MCGL, aimed at improving healthcare outcomes for women and children.

Stella has spearheaded several innovative and community-focused interventions, including pregnancy classes integrated with skills acquisition, sickle cell clinics, peer mentorship and coaching programmes, breast and cervical cancer awareness campaigns, and quality improvement projects.

Her dedication and impact have earned her numerous recognitions, including Best District Midwife (2023), Best District Nurse/Midwife (2024), Third Most Outstanding Staff in the Upper West Region (2022), and Best Success Story under the MCGL-USAID Peer Mentorship and Coaching Programme (2024).

Currently serving as a Regional Facilitator for the GCNM-IGNITE Project, Stella Bayor continues to inspire the next generation of midwives through mentorship, innovation, and professional leadership, advancing midwifery practice to greater heights.

The Ashanti Regional branch of the Ghana Registered Nurses and Midwives Association (GRNMA), in collaboration with the Ashanti Regional Health Directorate, successfully organised a three-day Nursing and Midwifery Leaders Workshop from 14th to 16th April 2026 at the GRNMA Guest House, Krapa.

The workshop brought together Nurse Managers, Maternity In-Charges, District Public Health Nurses, DDNS/DCNOs, and Nurse/Midwife Specialists from public, private, quasi, and CHAG health facilities across the Ashanti Region. The programme aimed at strengthening leadership capacity, enhancing clinical supervision, and promoting professional development within the nursing and midwifery workforce.

Key topics discussed during the workshop included ward-level emergency preparedness and leadership strategies for the early recognition and management of shock, retirement planning and financial security for an ageing workforce, as well as strengthening clinical leadership through improved accuracy in vital signs monitoring and interpretation.

The workshop was facilitated by distinguished nursing professionals and educators, including Mrs. Henrietta Delecter Ntow Serebour, Emergency Nurse Specialist (FGCNM); Mr. Thomas A. Asafo-Adjei, Deputy Chief Health Tutor and Emergency Nurse Specialist; and Mr. Jones Afriyie-Anto Esq., FGCNM and Deputy Chief Health Tutor.

In their closing remarks, the Ashanti Regional Chairman of GRNMA, Mr. Jones Afriyie-Anto Esq., and the Regional Chief Nursing and Midwifery Officer (CNMO), Ms. Ama Antwiwaa Opuni, expressed appreciation to participants for their active engagement and valuable contributions throughout the workshop.

GRNMA UPPER WEST REGIONAL EXECUTIVES TOUR SISSALA WEST DISTRICT AND MOURN LATE NURSE NAFISAH ADAMA.

Nurse Gbena Muniratu of Gwollu Health Centre recounted assisting the late Nafisah in packing medicines onto the motorbike shortly before news of the fatal accident reached them. She described the late nurse as compassionate, hardworking, and deeply committed to patient care.

During the tour, Mr. Lawrence Bagrmwin stressed the urgent need for psychological support for affected staff and the bereaved family, as well as the prompt implementation of workmen's compensation processes. He further called for support for the children and family left behind, noting that such responses would influence the morale of healthcare workers serving under difficult

The Regional Executive Committee (REC) of the Ghana Registered Nurses and Midwives Association (GRNMA), Upper West Regional Branch, undertook a working visit to the Sissala West District on 22nd May 2026 to engage members, assess working conditions, and gather firsthand information regarding the tragic death of Nurse Nafisah Adama, an Enrolled Nurse who died in a road accident on 11th May 2026 while transporting medicines from Gwollu Health Centre to Kusali CHPS Compound.

At Jeffissi Health Centre, the delegation held an interactive session with members and observed a minute of silence in honour of the late Nurse Nafisah Adama, Gyaburo Gracious, and all departed nurses and midwives. Addressing members, the Upper West Regional Chairman of GRNMA, Mr. Lawrence Bagrmwin, encouraged nurses and midwives to remain dedicated to patient care despite the painful loss and urged them to support one another emotionally and professionally.

Members raised several welfare and professional concerns affecting healthcare delivery and staff morale, including delays in the implementation of the 13th Month Allowance, delays in the issuance of PIN/AIN numbers by the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC), delays in staff conversion after further studies, challenges in accessing study leave, and delays in the distribution of annual souvenirs.

Members also appealed for stronger support systems for families of nurses and midwives who lose their lives in active service while commending the Association's loan scheme initiative. The death of Nurse Nafisah Adama remained the central focus of the tour, with many staff describing the incident as emotionally traumatic.

At Gwollu Hospital, the REC engaged management and the District Health Management Team (DHMT) on challenges affecting healthcare delivery. The Medical Superintendent, Dr. James Sunkari, highlighted the lack of operational vehicles within the district and urged healthcare workers to prioritise their safety by consistently wearing helmets while riding motorbikes.

The tour reaffirmed GRNMA's commitment to advocating for safer working conditions, improved staff welfare, and stronger institutional support systems for nurses and midwives dedicated to healthcare service delivery.

GRNMA CAPE COAST TEACHING HOSPITAL DISTRICT HOLDS FIRST QUARTER MEETING

The Ghana Registered Nurses and Midwives Association (GRNMA), Cape Coast Teaching Hospital (CCTH) District of the Central Regional Branch, successfully held its First Quarter Meeting on 13th May 2026. A LIFE OF SERVICE CUT SHORT: REMEMBERING MADAM NAFISAH ADAMA



The nursing and midwifery fraternity in the Upper West Region has been thrown into mourning following the tragic death of Madam Nafisah Adama, an Enrolled Nurse who served at the Kusali CHPS Compound in the Sissala West District.

Madam Nafisah Adama was widely admired for her dedication, compassion, and unwavering commitment to healthcare delivery in her rural community. As the sole nurse serving the area, she worked tirelessly to ensure that residents had access to essential healthcare services despite the numerous challenges associated with rural practice.

Reports indicate that she lost her life while returning from the Gwollu Health Centre, where she had travelled to collect medicines for the CHPS compound. Tragically, the motorbike she was riding collided with a tricycle, leading to her untimely death.

Painfully, Madam Nafisah was reportedly using her personal motorbike to carry out official healthcare duties due to limited logistical support within the community. Her sacrifice reflects the resilience and dedication demonstrated daily by many healthcare professionals working in underserved areas across the country.

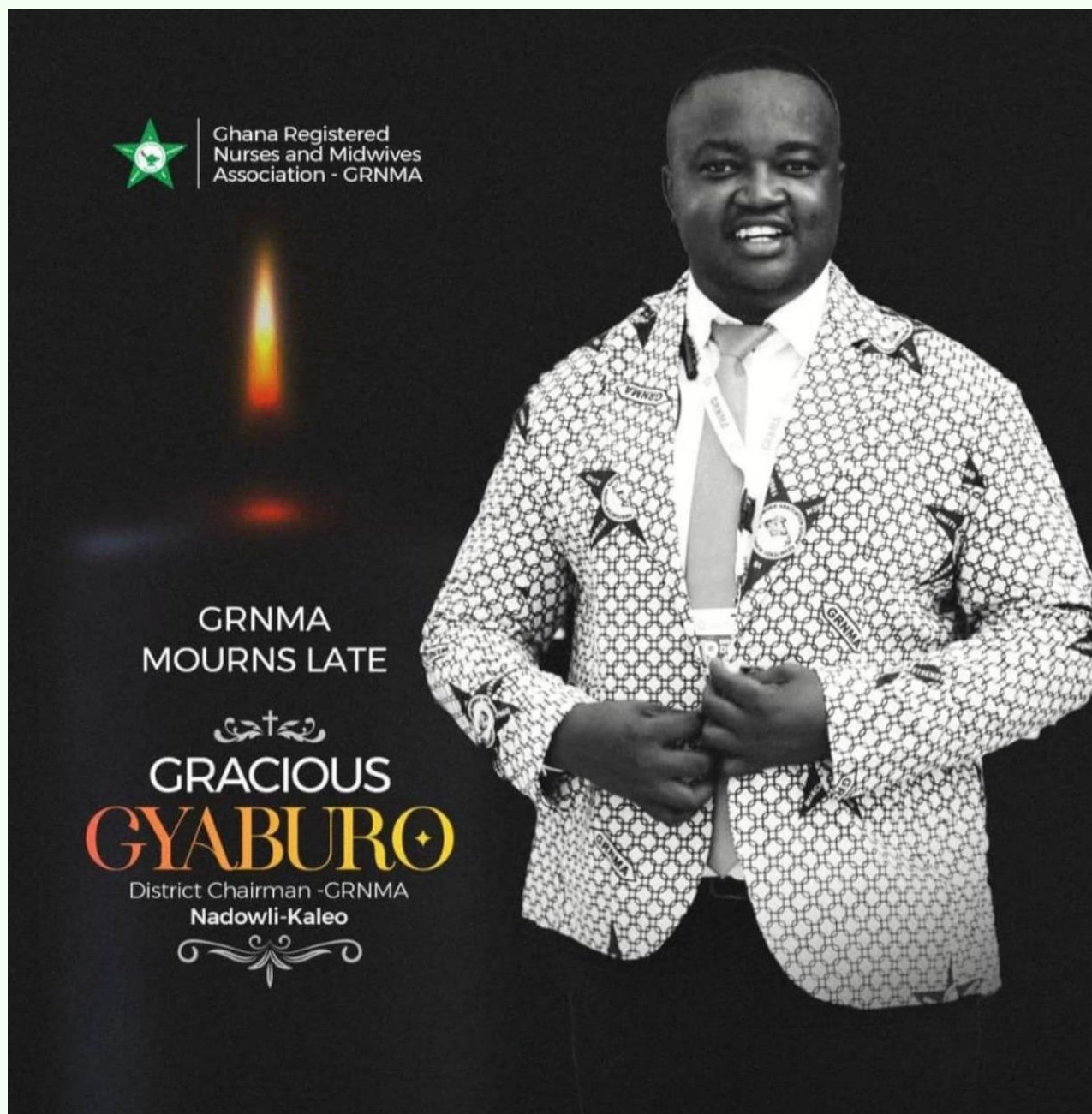

IN MEMORIAM: HONOURING THE LIFE AND SERVICE OF MR. GRACIOUS GYABURO



The nursing and midwifery fraternity has suffered a profound loss with the passing of Mr. Gracious Gyaburo, District Chairman of the Ghana Registered Nurses and Midwives Association (GRNMA), Nadowli-Kaleo District. His untimely demise while still in active service has left a void that will be deeply felt by colleagues, friends, family, and the communities he faithfully served.

Mr. Gyaburo was more than a leader; he was a committed advocate for nurses and midwives, a dependable colleague, and a servant of humanity whose dedication to professional excellence inspired many. Throughout his tenure as District Chairman, he demonstrated unwavering commitment to the welfare of healthcare professionals, championed unity within the Association, and worked tirelessly to advance the standards of nursing and midwifery practice in his district and beyond.
